Message from Our Pastor

In today's gospel, Jesus wisely avoids an insincere question by some of the Jewish leaders, a question designed to trap Him as an enemy of the Jewish people or as an enemy of the occupying Roman government. By his answer, Jesus reminds his audience of civic duty but, more importantly, of their duty to honor the one true God and Lord over all governments. EXEGESIS:

Some representatives of the Pharisees and the Herodians are sent to question Jesus in public. The Pharisees were one of the major political-religious parties in Israel, comprised largely of strictly pious laymen. "Disciples of the Pharisees, used only here in all the gospels, is an unusual phrase, because, since the Pharisees were not professional lawyers or priests, they unlikely would have had many disciples. Nonetheless, they were opposed to paying tax to the Roman Caesar (Emperor Tiberias), because to do so would be to acknowledge the rule of the pagan Romans over God's chosen people. Of course, to survive under the Roman government, they had to pay it. The Herodians, a minor party in Israel, did not oppose the tax.

The Pharisees try again to trap Jesus. If Jesus says it is legal (according to Jewish law) to pay the tax, the Pharisees will tell the Jewish commonfolk that Jesus supports paganism. If Jesus says it is illegal to do so, the Pharisees again will report Him to the Roman Governor as a person who is subtly pushing for some kind of insurrection against Roman rule. Using his typically clever wisdom, Jesus asks for a coin from these leaders. To his question as to whose image is on it, they answer "Caesar's." Jesus adds, "Then repay to Caesar what is Caesar's and to God what is God's." Notice that Jesus sidesteps the precise question as to the legality of that payment by speaking of repayment, not payment, and by not mentioning its legality or non-legality at all. In doing so, He acknowledges that it is a lesser evil to support the oppressive Roman government than to invite violent revolution and thus military destruction of the Jews. But his addition of "repayment to God" implies that the Jews must express gratitude to God himself in addition to any civic duty they might have.

A expression of humor might be in this scene. When Jesus holds up the very small coin with the picture of Emperor Tiberias and its inscription, "Tiberias, Divine Son of God," Jesus is implying that the so-called almighty, so-called divine Caesar is not great and not divine, but can easily have his image captured on a puny coin. And without saying so explicitly, Jesus is reminding his audience of the Jewish law which forbids any pictures or statues of the true God. In effect, Jesus is saying, "Look, guys, go ahead any pay the tax to this false son of the gods, Caesar. Just remember that our God is a million times greater as the one and only true God over all peoples and governments." Any listener who was open-minded to Jesus' words would have chuckled at his put-down of the pagan Roman government.

Questions arise as to our role today as Catholics in America in relation to our own civic government.
