Message from our Pastor

In today's Gospel, Jesus wants to purify the Temple by cleansing it of its unscrupulous businessmen who were cheating the poor. The Temple stands as the symbol of spiritually pure and honest worship of God. And Jesus' own body, which He predicts will be resurrected, becomes symbolic of the Temple itself. It will be a good reflection also in this coming weekend on the topic of poverty. How many of us really understand the meaning of charity.

EXEGESIS

For this and the following Sundays in Lent, the Church changes from using the Gospel of Mark to using the Gospel of John for its gospel readings, which gives us the opportunity to see some characteristics of John. The three other gospels place the Cleansing of the Temple in the last week of Jesus' life, so that this event will be the catalyst for the Jewish leaders to have Him arrested. But John places it at the beginning of Jesus' public ministry, so that Jesus' raising of Lazarus (mentioned only by John) can be the catalyst.

The Cleansing is one of the few instances in the gospels in which Jesus shows strong anger. Note that, even in his anger and whipping, He exercises subtle compassion for the poor. How? He punishes the cheaters, namely, the money changers by overturning their tables filled with coins, and the sellers of sheep and oxen by driving those animals away. Less-expensive doves were the only animals which the poor could afford for sacrifice in the Temple. So Jesus does not release the doves; He simply tells their sellers to remove them yet in their cages (so that the poor can still have easy access to buying them).

And unlike the other gospels, when John says "the Jews," he means their leaders, not the people as a whole. The leaders demand a sign from Jesus for his authority to cleanse the Temple. Signs are a strong motif in John, and he has Jesus predict his own resurrection as the ultimate sign. Lastly, unlike the other gospels, the Johannine Jesus occasionally reads the minds of his onlookers, as He does here in knowing well what his enemies are thinking.
